FEASTDAY OF THE WEEK - ST JOSEPH the WORKER (01 May): (From the Vatican II document 'Church in the Modern World') - "By his work a man (sic) ordinarily provides for himself and his family, associates with others as his brothers and sisters, and renders them service; he can exercise genuine charity and be a partner in the work of bringing divine creation to perfection. Moreover, we believe by faith that through the homage of work offered to God man is associated with the redemptive work of Jesus Christ, whose labour with his hands in Nazareth greatly ennobled the dignity of work. This is the source of every man's duty to work loyally as well as his right to work; moreover, it is the duty of society to see to it that, according to the prevailing circumstances, all citizens have the opportunity of finding employment. Finally, remuneration for work should guarantee the opportunity to provide a dignified livelihood for oneself and one's family on the material, social, cultural and spiritual level to correspond to the role and the productivity of each, the relevant economic factors of his employment, and the common good."

<u>The Dignity of Human Labour:</u> (From the NZ Catholic Bishops pastoral letter, May 2010)

"Work is often identified with employment, but it is much more than that. Work has a dignity of its own in that it expresses the self-worth of a person, something that can never be reduced to mere economic value. It is to be seen as a gift, in relation to the common good. 'My Work' must never be thought of as being for me alone. Nor can I regard work as being my own creation. In the invitation to partner the Creator in caring for all that exists, God has gifted work as a creative, healing, and renewing resource."

The bishops' encourage Catholics to question our consumer lifestyles, the effects of our purchases on those in the production line and the impact of our waste on the environment. Why? Because it was precisely through the "work of human hands" that Jesus built his own community. Fishermen, tentmakers, weavers, vinedressers, government officials, farm workers, men and women labourers of all kinds were among his first followers. He gave us the supreme example of how important it is to contribute to life through the gift of self.
